OPERATIONS

Performance goals for fiscal year (FY) 2012 are currently being negotiated with the Regional Conservationist. Expectations are that the goals will remain similar to last year.

Kansas completed a Risk Assessment in preparation for the National Quality Assurance Review scheduled in April. The assessment is a part of the quality assurance review process. It is an extensive look at five standards for internal control activities; control environment, risk

assessment, information and communication, and monitoring. The results of the assessment will then be incorporated into the quality assurance review to identify areas for improvement.

The Corrective Action Plan that is being required by all states has been revised. It includes several items including state-wide training and reviews of conservation program contracts to ensure that the corrective action items are being implemented. States are required to report on a quarterly basis their progress in addressing the items.

Kansas received our initial allocation for FY 2012. Although budgets are being reduced, Kansas should still be able to conduct fairly normal operations for this FY.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) announced the closing of 251 USDA offices including 24 soil survey offices. The Kansas Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) will be closing one soil survey office located within the Salina State Office. No NRCS field offices were affected.

PROGRAMS

Agricultural Water Enhancement Program (AWEP)

Kansas was allocated \$3,819,398 for FY 2012. All funds must be obligated by March 23, 2012.

Conservation Reserve Program (CRP)

The Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP) in the Upper Arkansas River Basin is still accepting offers and acreage is now eligible in Hamilton County.

• Conservation Security Program

Participants who wanted their payment in the 2011 calendar year have been paid. The remaining FY 2012 payments will be made by February 3, 2012.

Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP)

- Applications may be taken year-round; however, the cutoff date for the first ranking period is January 27 (extended from January 13). All applications must be ranked by February 24 in order to be funded. Additional information about the first ranking period for FY 2012 may be found on the national website at: http://www.nrcs.usda.gov/wps/portal/nrcs/main/national/programs/financial/csp/.
- o Participants who wanted their payment in the 2011 calendar year have been paid. The remaining FY 2012 payments will be made by April 2, 2012.

Emergency Watershed Protection Program (EWPP)

- Kansas has two recent EWPP non-exigent projects that have been submitted to the NRCS national headquarters and placed on the national wait-list for future appropriation approval. Sponsors are the city of Manhattan and the city of Beloit. A new EWPP request for assistance has been received from the city of Troy regarding damage from the Missouri River flooding during 2011.
- Kansas NRCS continues to participate in the 7-state Missouri River Flood Task Force established this past fall. Federal and state partners are working to assist those affected along the Missouri River by the 2011 spring and summer floods. Approximately 31,824 acres, predominately agricultural lands, were flooded in Kansas due to the Missouri

River flood according to Farm Service Agency (FSA), Kansas Department of Emergency Management, and U.S. Army Corps of Engineers estimates.

• Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP)

- The FY 2012 EQIP Allocations for Kansas have been received. The allocated funds were distributed as follows:
 - ◆ EQIP: General—\$17,149,067
 - ◆ EQIP: Lesser Prairie-Chicken Initiative—\$396,406
 - ◆ EQIP: Organic Initiative—\$383,388
 - ◆ EQIP: Ogallala Initiative—\$2,000,000
- All funds must be obligated by March 23, 2012. We have begun the ranking and obligation process.

• Farm and Ranch Lands Protection Program (FRPP)

NRCS is working with several cooperating entities to close on prior year enrollments. There are a total of six conservation easements to be closed by the end of March 2012.

Grassland Reserve Program (GRP)

- Kansas NRCS continues to work towards the acquisition of FY 2011 GRP enrollments.
- Once the FY 2011 easements are acquired, an approximate 4,900 acres of additional native Kansas grasslands will be preserved in Pottawatomie and Greenwood Counties.
- On-site monitoring for 32 recorded GRP easements was recently completed by the Ranchland Trust of Kansas under contract with NRCS. Minor issues were reported and most of the grassland was noted to be in good condition.
- Kansas has received \$1.4 million to fund FY 2012 GRP enrollments. Applications for FY 2012 GRP are to be submitted and ranked by January 25, 2012.

Watershed Rehabilitation Program Activities

- Kansas NRCS just received our FY 2012 Watershed Rehabilitation Program allocation that will provide technical and financial assistance to local watershed districts and conservation partners working on rehabilitation projects.
- Wakarusa Watershed District in Douglas County has signed the \$1.2 million rehabilitation construction project for site #24. Construction is to begin this spring.
- \$600,000 in construction funds have been awarded for the Spring Creek R-1 Dam Rehabilitation project in Sedgwick County. The rehabilitation design by NRCS is nearly completed. Construction on this site is expected to be completed prior to the end of FY 2012.
- Rehabilitation construction on Switzler Creek R-7 Watershed in Osage County is now complete. NRCS continues to work with the watershed district to close the construction phase and prepare for implementing the mitigation tree planting plan for the Switzler project this spring.
- Kansas NRCS did not receive FY 2012 funds for watershed rehabilitation planning for the 6 dam sites in Butler County that were requested.

Wetlands Reserve Program (WRP)

- Kansas has closed on seven new easements since October 2011, protecting 380 acres of wetlands.
- For FY 2012 funding, WRP applications that are submitted to the state office by February 22, 2012, that have had preliminary reviews, site visits, and ranking

worksheets completed, and the landowners have reviewed and returned the ranking worksheets, will be ranked for tentative approval. In addition, new applications that have a WRP ranking worksheet score of 50 or greater will be tentatively approved for WRP enrollment throughout the FY for as long as WRP funds remain available

Wildlife Habitat Incentives Program (WHIP)

The cutoff date for accepting applications for FY 2012 was November 15, 2011.
 Ranking is on hold until funds are received.

TECHNOLOGY

- National Resources Inventory (NRI)
 - Data entry by our field personnel is nearing completion for 2,551 sites included in the 2009 and 2010 Local Collection. This data collection will be used to update land use, erosion data, and conservation program information. When processed, the data will provide valuable trend information for Kansas.
 - We will soon be gearing up for the 2012 Grazing Lands On-Site Study. Eighty-three quarter sections have been selected for this year's data collection which will begin in May.
- Division of Conservation (DOC) Streambank Agreement
 - Six more projects have been built.
 - o Seven projects are in construction or preparing for construction.
 - The design has been finished on five projects and are awaiting permits.
- Architect and Engineer (A&E) Contracts
 - Preliminary designs have been completed for the three animal waste management systems.
 - Designs are underway for the four streambank protection projects.

OUTREACH

Outreach to inform Hispanic and/or Women Farmers and Ranchers has been halted for the time being. Outreach efforts involved all NRCS offices and employees by distributing information through the media, partners, and others on how to submit information for the claims process. Farm Service Agency (FSA) state office public affairs was the point of contact in Kansas. FSA, NRCS, and Rural Development were working together to get the word out for the past 10 months.

Cutoff dates for FY 2012 funding have been announced in the media for the following Farm Bill programs: CSP extended to January 27 and GRP, January 25. There will be three ranking periods for the Organic, On-Farm Energy, and Seasonal High Tunnel initiatives, all ending on February 3, March 30, and June 1, 2012. Ranking periods for the Air Quality Initiative end February 3 and March 30, 2012. The deadline for receiving requests for EWPP assistance for Kansans impacted by the spring and summer 2011 Missouri River floods in Doniphan, Atchison, Leavenworth, and Wyandotte counties has been extended to January 31, 2012. Prescribed Burning workshop locations and dates have been announced and can be found on the Kansas NRCS Web site. Presenters include representatives from the NRCS; FSA; Kansas Department of Wildlife, Parks and Tourism; Kansas Forest Service; U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service; National Weather Service; Kansas State University; as well as local fire and emergency management staff and local producers with burn experience.

Sharla Schwien, Supervisory District Conservationist, Ness City, presented at the TWIST Conference, K-State Salina. TWIST stands for Teen Women Interested in Science and Technology. The conference celebrated its 20th year. About 350 teen-age high school students attended the one-day conference and heard 17 presenters on career topics such as soil conservationist, Blackhawk helicopter pilot, engineering, and psychology. Students attended from around the Salina area as well as from Wichita to Marysville. This is the first year NRCS has presented at this conference.
