

WATER:

Improvements to existing programs?

- Simplified/centralized system to find the best options and get enrolled (how to start?)
- Economic analysis showing impact on the state
- Increased marketing, education, outreach
- Increased incentives for enrollment
- Policies that reflect regional water needs



WATER: New programs to help producers/businesses?

- Research and development in Farm Bill
- Ambassador program, mentorship, network to implement conservation
- Technical training, ways to use tech for improved conservation
- Incentives for conservation, adoption of tech
- Better understanding of resources and regulations



WATER: What's needed to encourage adoption/participation?

- Boots on the ground: increased \$\$, staff
- Crops that use less water
- More focus on soil health: relationship to water use
- Carryover of state dollars to make investment more effective



WATER: Other priorities/areas of emphasis?

- More funding, more people to help (technical assistance)
- How do we know whether current programs are working? How do we measure progress?
- Statewide focus of water as a Kansas Issue, not just an Ag Issue



WORKFORCE: Which current programs would work/help?

- Kansas Works program
- Ag career promotion to youth: making ag fun and appealing!
- Remote work certification at K-State
- Proactive recruitment by businesses
- Rural opportunity zone



WORKFORCE: What new or modified programs would help?

- Transition programs (military) and apprenticeships
- Benchmarks to show skills needed to increase wages
- Secondary school programs: mentors, technical training, immersion programs, work-based learning
- Postsecondary: technical training, certification
- Housing programs for H2A
- Drug rehabilitation (opioid addiction) programs



WORKFORCE: Where will you go to increase candidate pool?

- Expand ag career information to kids with interest in science, engineering
- Promote quality of life & affordability in Kansas
- Work with education system to integrate ag info into career paths, curriculum
- More affordable, accessible child care
- Attract a global workforce with a wide range of skills



WORKFORCE: Strategies/policy changes needed?

- Simplify federal programs: too much paperwork, too many restrictions
- Strategic H2A reform: It's a labor issue, not an immigration issue.
- Help for new/first generation farmers
- Livable wages, equity between big ag & little ag
- Expand ag education to include more urban and remote options


Teresa Brandenberg
