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NRCS HIGHLIGHTS OF ACTIVITIES for the STATE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

TOPEKA, KANSAS May 9, 2011

PERSONNEL

New Hires: Nathan M. Brenner, Soil Conservation Technician, Wellington

Retirements: Craig T. Scheuerman, Engineering Technician (Civil), Hays Area Office

OPERATIONS

Additional Toolkit training is being scheduled for 33 conservation district employees in late May. Additional ProTracts and eContracts training to further assist the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) with conservation plans and program administration is being scheduled for 23 conservation district employees in June.

A Workload analysis (WLA) has been completed. The Kansas Management Team has had an opportunity to review and discuss the data. A meeting will now be scheduled to discuss the results with the partners. The WLA included crediting time for partner and conservation district employees. The WLA shows a shortage of 4 employees in addition to the 10 vacancies that are outstanding.

The Fiscal Year (FY) 2011 Funding Bill eliminated funding for the Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) and Watershed Operations programs. NRCS is currently working through the closeout of these programs. The greatest impact to Kansas will be the RC&D Program. We have reassigned RC&D staff to work on other programs. We will also be closing most of our RC&D offices. Two of the offices will be maintained at this time to house staff working on other programs. The RC&D program, however, has not been eliminated. The RC&D Areas can continue to function as stand-alone entities and NRCS still considers them a viable partner for accomplishing the NRCS mission.

PROGRAMS

Agricultural Water Enhancement Program (AWEP)
 Application evaluation cutoff date was set for May 27th for the new Southwest Kansas GMD No. 3 AWEP project area. The project is looking at reducing water use and conversion to non-irrigated land.

75 Years—A Legacy to Conservation Helping People Help the Land Agricultural Water Enhancement Program—Conservation Reserve Program (AWEP—CRP)
 General Sign-up ended April 15th and NRCS is awaiting the total number of accepted offers from FSA in order to being developing conservation plans.

• Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP)

Kansas received over 300,000 additional acres for funding additional applications. All approved applications are to be obligated by May 24, 2011. To date, Kansas has received over \$14 million to fund fiscal year (FY) 2011 CSP applications.

Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP)

A second EQIP Organic Initiative application evaluation cutoff date has been set nationally for May 20th.

• Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) Cooperative Conservation Partnership Initiative (CCPI)

Kansas approved 19 applications for \$58,513 under the Forested Riparian Buffer CCPI. A total of 12 applications were approved under the Shelterbelt Renovation CCPI for \$83,145. The Shelterbelt Renovation CCPI had a total of 67 eligible applications for over \$325,000.

Wildlife Habitat Incentives Program (WHIP)

A second application evaluation period is going on now thru May 13th for the FY 2011 WHIP Lesser Prairie-Chicken Initiative.

TECHNOLOGY

- State Conservation Commission (SCC) Streambank Agreement
 - Seven projects are currently being designed.
 - o Two projects have been built.
 - Four projects are in various stages of construction.
 - Eighteen projects are currently waiting for permits.
 - Two projects have permits and are arranging for construction.

Architect and Engineer (A&E) Contracts

- Three task orders issued for the design of animal waste management systems are in the design phase with one to be finished soon.
- o The design was completed for one task order, and it has been sent to the producer.

Resources

- Will hold CRP training, with Farm Service Agency and Programs Staff, discussing field reviews and contract development for those CRP contracts accepted this last sign up.
- Working to develop base line information and data related to the State Resource Assessment.
- Will be working with partners to develop SWAT agreements in the Lesser Prairie-Chicken range. These agreements will provide for on-the-ground assistance related to promotion and implementation of the Lesser Prairie-Chicken Initiative.
- Continuing to provide on-site Toolkit and related training in management units and field offices.
