69 EQIP Streambank Projects are currently under contract covered by the TSP Cooperative Agreement

33 EQIP Streambank Projects are constructed (TSP complete)

The SCC received 7 Federal FY 2010 EQIP Streambank Projects in August 2010.

Bid Opening was on Nov. 16, 2010. The contract has not yet been awarded.

The Watershed Institute and Wildhorse Riverworks have been the two TSP sub-contractors to date.

The Cooperative Agreement with the NRCS expired Sept. 30, 2010

All current projects will continue to be administered under the cooperative agreement.

An announcement from the NRCS is expected soon advertising for a new Cooperative Agreement.

A. The Pilot Project: Mission Lake, City of Horton

1. Background

- ➤ Built in 1924 as a Water Supply for the City of Horton
- > Ceased serving as a Water Supply in 1999 (Water Quantity & Quality)
- Original surface area (lake) 169 ac.
- > Original storage capacity 1,866 ac-ft.
- > 2007 surface area (KBS) 124 ac.
- > 2007 storage capacity (KBS) 1,036 ac-ft.

2. Activities

- Main CDF (Low Hazard Dam: 52 ft. high, 4,055 ft. long Length) construction completed in October 2009
- > Groundbreaking celebration on October 7, 2009
- > Dredge started 2nd week of October 2009
- > Dredge stopped from Dec 12, 2009 to Mar 31, 2010 due to fridge temperatures.
- ➤ Slurry pumping rate ranged from 7,500 to 10,000 CY per 24 hr shift.
 - Solids: 20-28 %
 - Liquid: 72-80 %
- ➤ A secondary CDF₂ was completed on July 2010 (40 ac-ft)
- > Dredge completed on August 29, 2010
- > Main CDF seeding and stabilizing in progress:
 - Awaiting on NPDES permits closures, and
 - DWR Notice of proof and completion.

B. The Washington County Rural Water District No.1

- ➤ The Low Head Dam across the Big Blue River restoration was deemed not feasible as the September 2009 Preliminary Engineering Report [PER].
- ➤ Alternative for cost-effective water supply [SCC, KWO, KRWA & RWD1].
- > Identified 3 properties nearby where to test drill, with the assistance of Bob Vincent (Hydrologist from Wichita)
- > Two test wells were drilled, cleaned and pumped. One well was deemed not adequate as the water level dropped quickly. Bob Vincent recommended pumping the well for 48 hr to see if the taste disappear.
- > Samples were sent to ServiTech Lab for testing (high in iron by taste).
- > Still waiting!

C. Augusta City Lake

- > Letter of Intent (LOI) received
- ➤ LOI on Public Notice on July 15, 2010
- > Agreement between the City and the State executed, on October 18, 2010
- > SCC and City of Augusta and engineering met

FY 2011 WSRP budget appropriated: \$653,673, [\$283,000 on contract, the balance will be on the amendment, if no lapses occur].

OPERATIONS

- Cooperative Agreement Update
 - Oberlin and Ulysses Pheasants Forever (PF) biologists positions filled—completes currently agreed-to positions
 - Ryan Deiner started November 15 in Oberlin
 - Adam Kester will start December 20 in Ulysses
 - PF also working with the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks (KDWP) to fill
 positions in Abilene, Winfield, and Ness City shortly after first of January
 - All biologists, regardless of funding mechanism, are expected to produce the same expectations to meet NRCS and partner needs including conservation planning, sales of all conservation programs, and technical assistance
 - Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) and State Conservation Commission (SCC) met with Bourbon, Allen, and Neosho counties to establish SCC soil conservation

- technician (SCT) position for Iola Management Unit (position was scheduled for the Columbus Management Unit but decided to not participate in the program)
- SCC SCTs undergoing extensive training by NRCS and partners
 - Tool-Kit training, SCC and KDWP programs training, and Kansas Department of Health and Environment Watershed Restoration and Protection Strategy projects training
 - SCC SCTs will now be required to provide monthly reports of projects, programs, and practices they have assisted with
- All supervisory district conservationist (SCD) meeting held in early November covered management, communication, and leadership training; sharing of management successes and failures; and answering SDC questions on specific issues
- Conservation district employees training planned for January
 - Tool-Kit, ProTracts, and e-contracts to further assist NRCS with conservation plan and program administration
 - NRCS hopeful that those conservation districts that have offered to be of additional assistance will attend to help fully meet the requirements of the Local Operating Agreement

PROGRAMS

- Conservation Security and Conservation Stewardship Programs (CSP)
 - Currently CSP payments are being made for both Security and Stewardship contacts with 90% of payments made by December 15
 - January 7, 2011, deadline announced by national news release for anyone interested in participating in Stewardship signup period 1 for fiscal year (FY) 2011
- Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP)
 - See attached maps for EQIP and Agricultural Water Enhancement Program (AWEP) accomplishments
 - FY 2011 allocation of \$19.7 million received
 - \$1.4 million set aside for Organic
 - \$1 million set aside for Cooperative Conservation Partnership Initiative (CCPI)
 - \$500,000 set aside for the Lesser Prairie-Chicken Initiative (LPCI)
 - Cut-off date for ranking of FY 2011 applications was November 15, 2010, with funding decisions to be made in mid February
- Wildlife Habitat Incentives Program (WHIP)
 - o See attached maps for WHIP accomplishments
 - FY 2011 allocation of \$1.9 million received
 - Approximately \$73,000 set aside for CCPI
 - \$1.5 million reserved for the LPCI
 - Cut-off date for ranking FY 2011 applications was November 15, 2010, with funding decisions to be made in mid February
- Wetlands Reserve Program (WRP)
 - Kansas completed a record year this past fiscal year 2010 with WRP enrollment number and acres--23 applications enrolled encompassing 3,421 acres
- Farm and Ranch Lands Protection Program (FRPP)
 - Kansas achieved a milestone with the Farm and Ranch Land Protection Program in FY 2010

- With FY 2010 enrollments, Kansas now has over 30,000 acres (31,331 acres to be exact) protected from conversion to non agricultural use in perpetuity through partnerships with non-governmental land trusts
- Grassland Reserve Program (GRP)
 - More than 12,300 acres from 18 accepted offers in FY 2010 (although roughly 3,400 acres from one enrollment may be withdrawn in the near future)
 - If all enrolled acres are closed on, Kansas will have over 38,000 acres of grassland protected
 - Kansas should close on its (and to my knowledge the nation's) first GRP Cooperative Agreement by the end of the calendar year
- Watershed Operations: ARRA Funding
 - Constructed 1 new Floodwater Retarding Dam (Lyons Creek Site 15 in Morris County, financial assistance \$752,053)
 - Repaired the slope failure on Big Caney Site 18 in Cowley County, financial assistance \$324,627
 - Repaired severe erosion along the front slope of Wet Walnut Site 53 in Ness County, financial assistance \$212,204
- Watershed Rehabilitation
 - Assistance is currently being provided to 3 structures to bring them up to current high hazard safety standards
 - Switzler Creek Site 7—Expect to obligate funds for construction before December 1st with construction starting this fall or next spring
 - -- Spring Creek Site R-1—Plan/Environmental Assessment is being finalized and will be submitted to the Chief for approval by the end of December. Design will be completed by the fall of 2011 with construction to start in fall of 2011 or spring of 2012
 - Wakarusa—Plan/Environmental Assessment is being finalized and will be submitted to the Chief for approval shortly after the first of the year. Design is currently being developed with construction expected to start in the summer of 2011
- Emergency Watershed Protection (EWP) Program
 - In 2008, flooding in southeast Kansas caused auxiliary spillway damage to approximately 95 dams—EWP funding was approved to complete these repairs and the final 22 sites were completed in 2010
 - Currently EWP assistance is being provided to Lincoln County for streambank stabilization around 4 county bridges and to Jewell County to remove debris that is blocking the stream at 2 bridges
 - We will be submitting EWP applications to NHQ this week on 10 sites in 6 counties (Labette, Cherokee, Crawford, Chautauqua, Linn, and Dickinson)—total financial assistance requested \$254,000

TECHNOLOGY

- State Conservation Commission (SCC) Streambank Agreement
 - One project has been designed
 - o Seven projects in various states of construction with 2 of them in the checkout phase
 - Surveys of the remaining FY 2008 and 2009 projects will be completed this month—17 projects are in the design phase
 - Six FY 2010 EQIP streambank protection projects are out for bids

- The construction of 3 projects and the design of 1 project have been suspended because of ownership issues on the Kansas River
- Architect and Engineer (A&E) Contracts
 - Eight of the 9 task orders issued for the design of animal waste management systems are in the design phase (1 task order will be cancelled as the owner cancelled his EQIP contract)












Fiscal Year 2010 - Kansas Agricultural Water Enhancement Program **Contracts Approved**










Fiscal Year 2010 - Kansas Environmental Quality Incentives Program Applications Received*











Fiscal Year 2010 - Kansas **Environmental Quality Incentives Program Application Status**










Fiscal Year 2010 - Kansas Wildlife Habitat Incentives Program Applications Received*




















Fiscal Year 2010 - Kansas Conservation Stewardship Program Applications Received*
