### Kansas Association for Floodplain Management Conference

The Kansas Association for Floodplain Management (KAFM) held their 11th annual conference in Wichita on September 3 and 4, 2014. There was also a CFM review and the CFM test was given on September 5, 2014.

## Flood Insurance Refunds Start This Month

The Biggert Waters National Flood Insurance Reform Act of 2012 immediately moved some properties to full actuarial rating. An example of such a property would be when a home that existed prior to a Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) was sold. That property would have had to get an elevation certificate and pay full actuarial rates. The Homeowners Flood Insurance Affordability Act of March 2014 slowed down some of those rate increases by putting a cap of 18% to any rate increases in any given year for most classes of property. When the full actuarial rate was an increase of greater than 18% then that property might qualify for a refund.

This means that property owners who saw increases in flood insurance premiums of greater than 18% last year could be eligible for a one-time refund of a part of the premiums they paid last year. You may have heard about these refunds in mainstream media. Floodplain Managers should be very careful about discussing refunds with their citizens. Only a small percentage of people will actually get a refund. You do not want to give someone the impression they will get a refund in the case that they don't qualify.

There should not be any refunds at all for Pre-FIRM secondary homes or buildings meeting the definition of repetitively flooded. In order to help you to better understand which structures may qualify for a refund and which ones will not a hand out will be included with the email version of this issue of Floodplain Tips.

## How to Save Money on Flood Insurance

Some property owners will get refunds this year. Changes that came about under the Homeowners Flood Insurance Affordability Act will temporarily lower some flood insurance premiums. These events may give property owners the sense that they don't need to worry about flood insurance premiums. This is a false impression for any one to have. There is still a movement toward full actuarial rating. It will be a longer slower climb but most structures will eventually get to a full actuarial rating.

Owners of property in the floodplain should look at ways to save money on the cost of flood insurance now and not later. The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has published a brochure called "Cheaper Flood Insurance, 5 Ways to Lower the Cost of Your Flood Insurance Premium". A copy of the cost savings brochure from FEMA will be sent out with the email version of this newsletter.

The handout discusses 5 methods of retrofitting a property to save money.

- Elevating machinery and equipment above the base flood elevation;
- Installing flood openings in an enclosed area below the lowest floor;
- Filling in the basement;
- Elevating the structure; and
- Relocating outside of the floodplain.

It is realized that filling in of basements is not going to be a popular option here in Kansas. Some of these other methods should be considered carefully. A building on a crawl space, without flood openings, would save enough money from the lowered flood insurance premiums to pay for the expense of retrofitting to include openings. New development in the floodplain should consider relocating to a portion of a lot outside of the floodplain or elevating to a level that is more than just the minimum required by the community.

Another method that is not discussed in the brochure is to have an elevation certificate done. The rates for houses built prior to a Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) are going to continue to rise each year. These properties get a subsidized rating right now. The owner of a Pre-FIRM home can have an elevation certificate done now. The insurance agent can compare rates and give the property owner the Pre-FIRM rating or the actuarial rating based on the elevation certificate depending on which one is cheaper. The elevation certificate is kept by the agent and saved until a time when using it will provide the best rating.

### **Elevation Certificates and Letters Of Map Amendment**

This free class is designed for community officials responsible for administering floodplain management as well as surveyors and engineers who complete Letters Of Map Amendment (LOMA) and Elevation Certificate forms. The course will focus on accurate completion of Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) technical forms, building diagrams and base flood elevation. Approved 3.5 hours toward CFM. Limited to 20 participants.

#### **Basics of the National Flood Insurance Program**

This class is for officials responsible for administering their local floodplain management ordinance. The focus is on the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) and concepts of floodplain management, maps and studies, ordinance administration, and the relationship between floodplain management and flood insurance. Approved 3.5 hours toward CFM. Limited to 20 participants.
