

Dairy Farm Licensing Guide

The Kansas Department of Agriculture (KDA) is devoted to the total support of agriculture in Kansas. While we must fulfill our statutory obligations, the department is dedicated to providing support and assistance to make Kansas farms, ranches and agribusinesses successful and help them grow if that is their desire. We also encourage more farms, ranches and other agriculture businesses to expand in or relocate to Kansas. This checklist will help guide you through various resources and requirements for opening and operating a typical Kansas dairy farm. In addition to license requirements by KDA, other Kansas agencies, as well as local or federal government agencies, may have regulatory requirements to follow. Contact your local planning authority to ensure you follow all local business development laws, rules, regulations and guidelines. This guide is designed to assist you as you work to build and operate a successful dairy farm in Kansas.

An initial application form must be filled out prior to becoming licensed. An application for a dairy producer farm permit is included in the <u>Grade A Producer Information Packet</u> . 	Department of Agriculture — Division of Animal Health	Operations with a one-time capacity of more than 1,000 head must complete a <u>Confinement Facility License</u> application. For a multiple herd source dairy genetic sale or any other occasional sale of livestock, complete the <u>Occasional Sales Application</u> .	Prior to October 1
	www.agriculture.ks.gov	Interstate shipment of dairy cattle requires official identification of all animals, regardless of sex or age, and a certificate of veterinary inspection or other documentation. Sexually intact dairy cattle over 6 months of age imported into Kansas must have a negative tuberculosis test conducted within 60 days prior to movement into Kansas. Consult the Division of Animal Health Import and Export Regulations for a complete list of requirements or call 785-564-6601. Before exporting livestock from Kansas, contact the state of destination for their livestock import requirements. 	Department of Agriculture — Division of Water Resources <u>www.agriculture.ks.gov</u>	The state of Kansas requires a permit for water used for stockwatering. Stockwatering is the watering of livestock and other uses of water directly related to the operation of a feedlot with the capacity to confine 1,000 or more head of cattle; or any other confined livestock operation that would divert 15 or more acre-feet (4.88 million gallons of water) per calendar year. Any group of feedlots or confined feeding operations may be considered a single operation if there are common feeding or other physical facilities and the group of facilities is under common management. 	Department of Agriculture — Pesticide and Fertilizer	If the dairy will apply effluent to crops by blending effluent with fresh water through an irrigation system, a <u>Chemigation User's Permit</u> will be required. 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	Department of Agriculture — Weights and Measures <u>www.agriculture.ks.gov</u>	No license is needed from Weights and Measures. Any business with a weighing or measuring device (e.g. scales, fertilizer meters, oil meters, measuring tapes, electric car chargers, taxi meters, etc.) must hire a <u>licensed service company</u> to inspect and test devices once annually, and any time additional maintenance, repairs, adjustments and calibrations are made throughout the year if the devices are used to determine the cost of any transaction. Examples include scales at grocery stores, yogurt shops, restaurants, hardware stores, nurseries, seed dealers, etc. Examples of meters include meters used at a car service center to add oil to your engine, fertilizer meters at agronomy centers, water meters in grocery stores for sale of bottled water, etc. For more information, visit the <u>Weights and Measures Program</u>	Annual service

	Department of Health and Environment — Bureau of Environmental Field Services, Livestock Waste Management Section	Any facility that confines 300 animal units or more or has a daily discharge must <u>register</u> with the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE). Animal units can be calculated on the registration form. The need for additional permits and nutrient management plans will be determined based upon the number of animal units and pollution potential. 	Department of Health and Environment — Bureau of Water, Industrial Program Section	An <u>NPDES Construction Stormwater Permit</u> is required only if one or more acres are disturbed during construction. The permit is required prior to the start of soil disturbing activities (construction). For more information, visit the <u>KDHE Industrial Programs</u> website or call (785) 296-5549. 	Department of Health and Environment — Bureau of Water, Municipal Program Section <u>www.kdheks.gov</u>	If the facility will employ an on-site wastewater treatment system for human wastewater rather than utilize a municipal sanitary sewer for handling and disposal of sewage from the facility, contact the <u>KDHE Municipal Program Section</u> at (785) 296-5527 for construction and permitting requirements. 	Department of Health and Environment — Bureau of Water, Public Water Supply and Geology & Well Technology Section	If the facility will not utilize a municipal public water supply or rural water supply as the source of drinking water and the facility will serve 25 people or more per day, 60 or more days per year, it will be considered a public water supply subject to state/federal drinking water requirements. 	Department of Health and Environment — Bureau of Environmental Remediation, Storage Tank Section	Entities operating their own fuel tanks may be required to register with the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE). Review information about aboveground storage tanks (AST) and underground storage tanks (UST). Review the <u>KDHE Storage Tank</u> <u>Section</u> website for further information, or call (785) 296-1678 for permitting information. The <u>Kansas Small Business Environmental Assistance Program</u> (SBEAP) has AST program highlights and registration requirements in addition to assistance with UST inventory control. A <u>guidance document</u> is available to assist in determining regulatory requirements.
