

Guide to Starting a Kansas Farmers' Market

The Kansas Department of Agriculture (KDA) is devoted to the total support of agriculture in Kansas. This checklist will help guide you through various resources and requirements for opening and operating a typical Kansas farmers' market. Contact your local planning authority to ensure you follow all local business development laws, rules, regulations and guidelines. This guide is designed to assist you as you work to build and operate a successful farmers' market in Kansas.

	Office of the Secretary of State https://sos.ks.gov/	Complete the appropriate business entity <u>filings and forms</u> required by the Kansas Secretary of State. Call (785) 296-4564 for more information.
	Department of Revenue	Visit the Kansas Department of Revenue (KDOR) website to find important <u>business tax information</u> . Call (785) 368-8222 for more information.
	www.ksrevenue.gov	One month prior to the market opening, market coordinators should contact a <u>KDOR special events</u> agent to obtain a <u>special event coordinator's sales tax packet</u> for distribution to vendors who will only sell products four or fewer times a year.
		Market coordinators will need to provide KDOR a finalized list of vendors with street address mailing contact information after the event.
		Vendors selling products at five or more events per year should register for a sales tax account with the state to be able to pay online at www.webtax.org .
		Review additional information on collecting sales tax for special events or normal circumstances.
	Department of Agriculture —From the Land of Kansas www.FromTheLandOfKansas.c om	Registration of farmers' markets with the Kansas Department of Agriculture through the <i>From the Land of Kansas</i> program is voluntary. However, registration provides markets limited liability through K.S.A. 2-3801 et seq by stating any participant would assume the inherent risk of attending, participating or selling goods at a registered market.
		Farmers' market managers can access an online toolkit guide. Recommended good practices for a farmers' market manager include maintaining an up-to-date list of vendors, establishing by-laws for the farmers market and verifying required food safety licenses from vendors.

	Department of Health & EnvironmentCommunity Health Promotion Community Health Promotion KDHE, KS	Kansas Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition Program (KSFMNP) benefits can be accepted by authorized farmers at farmers' markets in Kansas. Acceptance of KSFMNP benefits offers opportunities for an expanded consumer network. Applications to become an authorized farmer are due by June 1 st annually. 	Double Up Food Bucks (DUFB) www.doubleupheartland.org	DUFB partners with farmers markets, farm stands, and mobile markets to increase fruit and vegetable purchases by giving SNAP EBT card users a \$1 match, up to \$25 per day, for every \$1 in SNAP they spend at a participating location.
