

#### HORSES ARE LIVESTOCK


- Horses have ALWAYS been livestock.
- The definition of horses as livestock was blurred due to marketing campaigns in the mid-1990s which aimed to re-classify these animals as pets and companion animals.
- Though their farm and ag duties have changed, the way we care for them really hasn't. They still require ample space to move, and ample hay, grain and water for nutrition.
- In 2018 the USDA Farm Bill declared "Horses Are Livestock"
- The Kansas Constitution states that Horses Are Livestock.
- The Kansas Statutes surrounding animal welfare identify horses as livestock. To change this would have many NEGATIVE effects. There are tax implications, it would change veterinary medication and research, it would change animal keeping requirements and it would negate the domestic livestock/equine liability law.

For the "Defining Horses as Livestock" priority, action was taken to create a video campaign to educate viewers that horses are classified as livestock in KS.

This video continues to be shared through social media. Also, a small bullet point note is included with horse council membership packets to be shared with others.

#### **History**

Through consolidation of the Livestock Sanitary Commission and the State Brand Commission in 1969, the Kansas Division of Animal Health (DAH) was created. Currently there are three programs that make up the DAH - Animal Disease Control, Animal Facilities Inspection, Brands Program - all of which work to ensure the health and welfare of Kansas livestock and domestic animals. The DAH works in conjunction with two essential boards: the Animal Health Board and the Pet Animal Advisory Board. In 2011, the DAH joined with the Kansas Department of Agriculture, and in 2014 relocated to Manhattan, Kansas.



"To understand these results, we measure three different types of impacts across four different economic measures. The expenditures support 1,845 jobs in the equine sector. It generated \$67 million worth of labor income, employee compensation plus proprietor's income. It generated \$83 million of total value added, labor income plus other property income (dividends, interest, rents, etc.) plus taxes. It also generated about \$150 million worth of output, total sales."

<sup>&</sup>quot;These direct effects also generate activity indirectly by stimulating other industries who supply inputs to the equine sector that are directly affected by the sales. Finally, all the workers who are both directly and indirectly affected use their income to buy household goods and services, the induced effect. When all is tallied, the Kansas equine industry supports and is closely tied to about 2,600 jobs, \$150 million of all types of income, and \$280 million of total economic activity."

#### Head Count/Inventory Value: 70,009 head equating to \$260 Million in total equine value

"From our survey, we established a total value of the represented animals at roughly \$30 million. Our survey represents 11.5 percent of the total animal population and is considered representative of the population. Based on the survey results, we estimate the total equine population to have a value of approximately \$260 million as shown in Table 1."








June 3rd, 2024: A proviso signed to direct 3% of revenues realized from 1,000 Historical Horse Racing Machines to be allocated to the KS Horsemen's Fund (1% to support fair board operations of live racing, 1% to support the winning purses-added money, and 1% to the KS bred incentive-added money.

HHR Machines will be operational starting in September 2025.

#### "Live Horse Races coming Spring 2026 at Eureka Downs"

Current Efforts: "Reviving" the KS Quarter Horse Racing Association, and "Remaking" a KS Thoroughbred Racing Association.

Smaller breed groups with racing stock are also included in conversations.

#### Need: A new racing specific equine economic impact report.

Focused on the 3% revenue stimulus

and

The value of live racing to the state

- (Agriculture benefit) revitalized breeder operations, increased equine inventory and circulation of new money in the KS economy
- (Commerce benefit) added tourism dollars and jobs growth to Greenwood County/Eureka, KS (currently the ONLY place prepared for live racing in KS)

Proviso expires June 2026.

Work must be done to codify this appropriation before then.

Report will be used for legislative attention aimed at codifying the proviso to maintain the appropriations of 3% HHR gaming revenues to the KS Horsemen's fund in perpetuity.

Estimated cost for this report is \$30,000.

A fundraising campaign may be needed.
